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A "VERY BRIEF" COMMENT ON THE HEALTH CARE REFORM ACT

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (Pub. L. No. 111-148) became law on March 23, 2010. Depending on the source and format, the Act consumes over 2,000 printed pages. Any detailed discussion of its specific requirements is well beyond the scope of this overview. Generally, the Act will have broadranging effects on several groups, including large and small employers, health care plans, health care providers, and the general public (particularly those currently underinsured or without health



insurance altogether). Whether these effects are good or bad depends upon the perspective of the individual or group asking the question. One thing is clear, however. The Act is not designed to directly reform the actual delivery of health care services, but rather to reform the mechanism for funding health care services. Some of the high points of the Act in each of these areas include:

Effects on Employers:

- Requirement for reasonable employee break time in a shielded location for nursing mothers;
- Non-discrimination rules and whistle blower protections preventing employers
 from discriminating or retaliating against workers who receive health care sub
 sidies, report violations of the Act, testify or assist in proceedings involving
 such violations, or object to or refuse to participate in actions they reasonably
 believe violate the Act;
- A tax credit to assist small employers (defined as no more than 25 FTE's) in purchasing health insurance for employees; and
- Future financial penalties for employers with more than 50 FTE's for failure to provide minimal essential health care coverage.

Effects on Health Plans and Individuals

• Extended coverage for children up to 26 years of age, whether married or not, if the child would be treated as a dependent under the plan but for age and the child is not eligible to enroll in an employer-sponsored health plan;

- Removal of pre-existing condition exclusions, initially for children under age 19, and after January 1, 2014, for all participants;
- Prohibitions against rescinding coverage absent fraud or intentional misrepresentation to material fact;
- A prohibition on setting life-time coverage limits for essential health care benefits;
- A requirement for provision of certain preventative services without imposing co-pays or deductibles;
- Limitations on HSA and FSA tax free reimbursements for nonprescription drugs, increased taxes for distributions for nonqualifying medical expenses, and maximum annual contribution caps on FSA accounts of \$2,500, effective January 2013;
- Increases in Medicare hospital insurance tax withholding and taxes on unearned income affecting wages in excess of \$200,000 for single filers, and \$250,000 for joint filers, effective January 1, 2013;
- The creation of insurance exchanges for high risk individuals with written notice required to employees no later than March 1, 2013; and
- Changes in the Medicare prescription drug program to close the so-called donut hole for Medicare beneficiaries.

Effect on Health Care Providers:

- Requirement that referring physicians with an interest in the referral entity provide patients written notice at the time of
 the referral for MRI, CT and PET, that the service can be obtained from other providers, including a written list of suppliers
 who furnish the service in the area:
- Requirement that Medicare overpayments be reported and returned within sixty (60) days after they are "identified," to
 the applicable contractor, intermediary or carrier; failure to so report and return creates liability under the Federal Civil
 False Claims Act:
- Amendments to the federal Anti-Kickback Statute and False Claim Qui Tam Action provisions;
- The development of a self-disclosure protocol for actual or potential violations of the Stark laws;
- Changes in Medicare and Medicaid payments;
- A requirement that tax exempt hospitals conduct community needs assessments and adopt: (i) an implementing strategy
 to meet identified needs; (ii) a financial assistance policy setting eligibility criteria; (iii) a basis for calculating charges to
 patients; (iv) a method for applying for financial assistance; (v) a plan for actions to be taken in the event of nonpayment,
 if the hospital does not have a separate billings and collections and measures to publicize the financial assistance policy;
 (vi) limitations on charges for emergency and medically necessary care to individuals eligible for assistance to no more
 than amounts generally billed to those who have insurance; and (vii) reasonable policies to determine whether
 individuals are eligible for assistance; and
- A reduction in the timely filing deadline for Medicare fee-for-service claims from three (3) years to one (1) year from the date of the service.

The Act establishes staggered effective dates for its requirements. All of the requirements are not being fully phased-in until 2014. Practitioners need to be careful to identify the effective date of any changes that may affect his or her clients. Also, keep in mind that for many of the provisions, the statute provides only a sketchy outline of the requirements. The details will be filled in by the federal regulation process, which may take many months to complete. All of this adds up to considerable uncertainty for both lawyers and their clients.

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WILLS FOR HEROES

Thanks to the dedicated efforts of 31 lawyers from the Roanoke and Salem/Roanoke County Bar Associations, working along with 27 other volunteers, 137 firefighters, EMT's, sheriff's deputies, police officers and spouses throughout the Roanoke Valley received free estate planning documents through the Wills for Heroes Program last month. As those who volunteered their time know, Wills for Heroes is a great opportunity for members of the legal community to say "thank you" to local first responders by providing a valuable service.

The Wills for Heroes Program was created in the wake of the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks, after it was revealed that most of the first responders who lost their lives in the line of duty lacked basic estate planning documents. In recognition of the services and sacrifices made by the first responders, the Virginia State Bar Young Lawyers Division, the Virginia State Bar Young Lawyers Conference, and the George Mason University School of Law worked together to develop the Wills for Heroes Program, designed to enable local volunteer attorneys to provide free basic estate planning services to first responders. The program was last offered in the Roanoke area in 2004.

First responders from Roanoke City, Roanoke County, City of Salem, and Botetourt County were invited to participate in this year's program. To be eligible to receive free estate planning documents, the first responders and their spouses were required to attend an educational session to learn about the documents that would be provided and the parameters of the program. Additionally, the volunteer lawyers were required to attend a CLE to receive training on the software and basic estate planning options available to the first responders and their spouses. During one-hour sessions on May 15 and 19, 2010 at the Regional Training Center, first responders and their spouses consulted with volunteer attorneys and received free wills, powers of attorney, and advance medical directives.

The first responders were very appreciative of the Wills for Heroes Program and the efforts of the local volunteer lawyers. One participant noted, "Your service is one we need but avoid either do to psychology or finances. Thank you for making this easy and painless."

The success of the Wills for Heroes Program was due to a collaborative efforts of the local volunteers and my fellow members of the Roanoke Bar Association Wills for Heroes Committee, including Christen Church, Lauren Davis, Macel Janoschka and Brooke Rosen.

Urbanski introduced the speaker, noting that among many accomplishments, Professor Howard has been named by Washingtonian magazine as one of the most respected educators in the

nation and has served as executive director of the commission that wrote Virginia's new Constitution and as counsel to the General Assembly of Virginia, the United States Senate Judiciary Committee, and the Governor of Virginia.
